# More North Carolinians can get health care coverage through Medicaid.

- North Carolina is providing health care coverage to more people through Medicaid.
- Medicaid now covers people ages 19 through 64 years with higher incomes.
- You may be able to get Medicaid even if you didn't qualify before.
- Medicaid pays for doctor visits, yearly check-ups, emergency care, mental health and more – at little or no cost to you.





# **Coverage through Medicaid lets you get the health care you need.**

#### Medicaid covers most health services, including, but not limited to:

- primary care so you can go to a doctor for a check-up or when you are not feeling well
- hospital services when you need to stay overnight (inpatient) or when you can go home the same day (outpatient)
- maternity and postpartum care if you are pregnant and after giving birth

- prescription drug benefits to pay for your medicines
- behavioral health
- preventive and wellness services
- dental and oral health services
- medical-related devices and other therapies

#### More North Carolinians are now eligible.

People ages 19 through 64 years old with income up to 135% of the Federal Poverty Level.

Family Size	<b>2025 Monthly Income*</b> <i>(before taxes)</i>
Single Adults	\$1,800 or less
Family of 2	\$2,433 or less
Family of 3	\$3,065 or less
Family of 4	\$3,698 or less
Family of 5	\$4,340 or less

\*Income limits are effective until April 1, 2026.

Include these people in your family size, even if they do not need Medicaid:

- You
- Your spouse
- Your children age 21 or younger, including stepchildren
- Any other person on the same federal income tax return

#### **Exceptions:**

- If you are age 21 or over, do not include your parents who live with you and file their own tax return
- Do not include other adult relatives who file their own tax return



### If you were eligible for Medicaid before, you still are.

Children, pregnant women, older adults, people with blindness and with disabilities who meet the criteria below may be eligible for Medicaid.

### Are immigrants eligible for Medicaid?

Some non-U.S. citizens can get health coverage through Medicaid. **To be eligible you must be:** 

- A person living in North Carolina
- A non-citizen with qualified immigration status. Most people must wait five years. Qualified immigration status includes:
  - Lawful Permanent Residents
     (LPR/Green Card Holder)
  - Asylees
  - Refugees
  - Cuban/Haitian entrants
  - Paroled into U.S. for at least one year
  - Conditional entrant granted before 1980
  - Battered non-citizens, spouses, children or parents

- Victims of trafficking and his or her spouse, child, sibling or parent or individuals with a pending victim of trafficking visa application
- Granted withholding of deportation
- Member of a federally recognized Indian tribe or American Indian born in Canada
- Citizens of the Marshall Islands, Micronesia and Palau who are living in one of the U.S. states or territories (referred to as Compact of Free Association or COFA migrants)





#### **Temporary Health Coverage for Emergency Conditions**

Non-citizens without documents who do not qualify for full health coverage under Medicaid may be able to get temporary coverage for emergency conditions that need to be treated in an emergency room.

#### How much does Medicaid cost me?

- You do not have to pay any monthly premiums.
- Medicaid pays the cost for most health care services.
- The highest copay is \$4 and that is only required on some services.





#### What information do I need to apply?

It takes time to complete the application. Here is some of the information you will be asked to provide for each person applying:

- Full legal name
- Date of birth
- Social Security number (or immigration documents)
- North Carolina residency (mailing address)
- Income information (from paystubs, W-2 forms, tax returns or business records)
- Your signature (digital, voice or written depending on how you apply)

North Carolina uses external resources to verify the information you provide. If more information is needed, you will receive a letter in the mail from your local Department of Social Services (DSS).

# What documents can be used if DSS asks for more information?

North Carolina Residency	<ul> <li>A photo ID with your NC address listed, or</li> <li>A utility bill, or</li> <li>A lease or mortgage agreement, or</li> <li>Documentation of employment, or</li> <li>If you do not have any documentation, you can check a box in ePASS labeled "NC Residency Declaration."</li> </ul>
Income Information	<ul> <li>If you're <b>Employed</b> - pay stubs, employer verification or your most recent tax return to show proof of your income.</li> <li>If you're <b>Self-Employed</b> - your most recent tax return or copies of your business records. If you don't have that, you can fill out a <u>Verification Form for Self-Employment Income and Expenses</u> form.</li> </ul>
Date of Birth	<ul> <li>A photo ID with your date of birth listed, or</li> <li>Birth certificate.</li> </ul>
Social Security Number	<ul> <li>A copy of your Social Security card or proof you've applied for one, or</li> <li>Another official document containing your name and SSN, or</li> <li>A military ID card.</li> </ul>
Citizenship	<ul> <li>Birth Certificate, or</li> <li>Passport.</li> </ul>
Immigration Documents	A copy of your VISA/immigration card.

# After I apply, how long does it take to find out if I can be covered through Medicaid?

It can take up to 45 days after you apply. Incomplete applications may take longer. You can help the process go faster by:

- Applying online at ePASS or HealthCare.gov and providing all information requested. If the application is incomplete, it may take longer to process. Your local Department of Social Services (DSS) will reach out to you if they do not have what is needed to complete your application, so be sure to respond to mail or phone calls.
- Keeping your contact information up to date in ePASS, so you don't miss important information about your Medicaid benefits.
  - Sign up for an enhanced ePASS account. An enhanced ePASS account allows you to keep your information updated without having to contact the local DSS office.



#### What happens once I'm approved?

- Most people who get health coverage through Medicaid are part of NC Medicaid Managed Care. This means you can choose the health plan that is best for you.
- All health plans offer the same base services. Some have extra services. Each has its own network of doctors and professionals.
- You can choose your health plan and your primary care doctor your family doctor, clinic or health care provider when you apply.
- You will receive a health plan ID card in the mail. It will come from the health plan that you selected during the application process. If you did not select a health plan, one will be assigned to you. You have 90 days to pick a new one. You will receive a packet from the NC Medicaid Enrollment Broker that tells you how to change plans.
- Your ID card also has the name of your primary care doctor. If you did not choose one when you applied, one will be assigned to you.

### What if I'm still not eligible?

- You can find out if you are eligible for Medicaid and apply through ePASS or HealthCare.gov.
- If you still are not eligible for health coverage through Medicaid, you may be able to get other health coverage options through the Affordable Care Act Marketplace at HealthCare.gov.
  - Many households that apply may be eligible for help to pay for their premiums.
- If you don't have health insurance, you can also get basic health care services at federally qualified health centers, rural health clinics and free and charitable clinics. Costs vary based on income. Learn more at <u>www.ncdhhs.gov/divisions/office-rural-health/safety-net-resources</u>.
