# Looking Back: SFY 2021 Final Position

## NC Medicaid SFY 2020-21: Actuals vs. Budget

NC Medicaid spent approximately \$3.9b (95%) of the authorized appropriations budget in SFY 2020-21.

# SFY 2020-21 Expenditures

**Overall spending was <u>below projections</u>:** 

- Effects of social distancing (low claims volume)
- Extension of public health emergency and the enhanced FMAP (net gain to state)
- Added/Auto-extended beneficiaries (i.e., source of enrollment growth) on average lower acuity than expected
- COVID treatment and testing costs lower than expected

# **After Launch: July 6 Medicaid Check Write**



## **Increase in Capitated Payments**

Through August, capitated payments increased from 25% of total check write payments in SFY 2021 to 51% of payments in SFY 2022.
